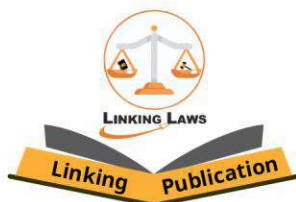

INTERVIEW

Successful candidates will be called for interview in the **ratio of 1:3** to available vacancies. Also if there is more than one candidate who has obtained uniform final marks fixed to keep the ratio of 1:3, all such candidates will be called for interview. will be called.

Securing at **least 50 per cent marks** in each question paper shall be the minimum qualification to be eligible to be called for interview:

In the case of candidates belonging to communities recognized as backward by the Government of Maharashtra for the purpose of service admission, securing at **least 45 per cent marks** in each paper shall be the minimum qualification to be eligible to be called for interview.

Interview 50 Marks - Only candidates securing 40% or more marks in Interview will be considered for final selection.

However, it does not mean freedom to do anything, and it must be exercised within the constitutional limits. Constitution provides for Liberty of thought, expression, belief, faith and worship.
